### The Help Our Animals Initiative

Option 1 would construct a much needed “dog walk” for the animal shelter, so that dogs were able to exercise and escape from being locked up in cages during their stay. This would be a sheltered area at the rear of the animal shelter with a water sprinkler system and the ability for dogs to exercise without having to have a person directly supervise.

Option 2 would complete a room in the animal shelter so that a veterinarian could administer health services to animals. This could be a “pay per” service for residents, or not. This would just allow the room to be ready for such a service.
